Regional reports

These reports are from individuals within the region and are their particular observations. They are included to give an impression of the present 'state of the industry' and regional activities.

- **British Columbia, Fraser Valley** (10/14) Spotted Wing Drosophila trapping over the last couple of weeks has shown it to be well distributed in all areas of the Fraser valley; some were even found in grapes last week. A BC working group is having a first meeting next week to discuss strategy. We plan to participate in a PNW-wide effort (see pest information section below for more Spotted Wing Drosophila information).
- Northern Washington, Whatcom County (10/12) Lots and lots of frost with the nice weather we have had. Rain is starting tonight. It should clear up around April or May.
- Northern Washington, Skagit County (10/12) Things are definitely winding down. Only one grower still picking in the valley. Fall protection cover sprays are mostly on, and a good deal of fall herbicide work is finished. Recent frosts are hastening the rush to dormancy. A good thing, if it's going to turn winter and not let up! The Spotted Wing Drosophila issue is going to be huge, as it has cost some growers here quite a bit, even though the infestation came late. Nothing like making juice out of two dollar fifty cent fruit to get attention.

Chemical Control Update

• **Broadleaf weeds, blueberries:** Once blueberry leaves turn red and start to drop, <u>Saber (2,4-D)</u> herbicide can be used for control of broadleaf weeds with much reduced risk of plant damage. Always use caution when using 2,4-D in blueberries.

Insects

New potential pest alert: Spotted Wing Drosophila (SWD), all berry crops:

- Economic damage, in some cases severe, from SWD has been identified this fall in western Oregon and western Washington blueberries, blackberries, and primocane raspberries.
- The pest has been recovered in all west side berry growing areas of Oregon, Washington and British Columbia.
- Since we still don't have good knowledge of the lifecycle and overwintering ability of SWD in the Northwest, it seems prudent to assume that it presents a very serious threat to the berry crops in these areas until shown otherwise.
- Next season will fill in a lot of gaps in our knowledge, but we don't want that knowledge to come at the expense of crop losses and/or unneeded insecticide applications.
- <u>Strawberry Crown Moth</u>, **strawberries**: Infested strawberry plants either completely collapse or are weakened and show premature reddening.
- <u>Strawberry Crown Moth</u>, **blackberries**: In blackberries, primocanes are girdled and easily break during training. Infested fields show fewer, weaker canes.
- Weevils, strawberries: <u>Black Vine</u>, <u>Strawberry</u> and <u>Rough Strawberry</u> root weevils. With cool, wetter fall weather, weevil adult feeding damage (leaf notching) can be found. Rough Strawberry root weevils also lay

eggs during this time and control measures for Rough Strawberry and other species could be needed in infested fields.

Diseases

- Godronia Canker, British Columbia blueberries.
- Bacterial Blight, blueberries.
- <u>Phytophthora Root Rot</u>, raspberries: <u>Ridomil</u> can be applied just before heavy rains start. Gypsum applications as well as anything that improves drainage (hilling and/or subsoiling) are also beneficial for root rot control.
- Rust in Evergreen Blackberries: (Phragmidium violaceum): It has become very active with the cooler
 weather. It's recommended that you remove all old fruiting canes as soon as possible to minimize the amount
 of infected material in the field.

Cropwork

All crops

- Can take soil tests for fertility and/or nematodes.
- Maintain weed control.
- Scout for voles and treat as needed.

Caneberries

- Can cut out old floricanes now and tie up primocanes.
- Scout and mark problem weed areas that could be treated in the winter.
- Can apply Ridomil for root rot control.
- Apply lime, dolomite, gypsum and/or fall fertilizer.
- Subsoil and/or hill.
- Can apply copper or Bordeaux after tying up canes.
- Can drench for borer control.

Blueberries

- Scout for weevil notching on lower leaves.
- Apply copper or Bordeaux for bacterial canker.
- Apply sulfur, lime, dolomite, gypsum and/or fall fertilizer.

Strawberries

- Scout weak areas for root weevil larvae, Strawberry Crown Moth, root disease or soil problems.
- Scout for weevil notching on leaves.
- Apply lime, dolomite, gypsum and/or fall fertilizer.
