### **Regional reports**

*These reports are from individuals within the region and are their particular observations. They are included to give an impression of the present 'state of the industry' and regional activities.*

- **Fraser valley, British Columbia (3/29/09) Blueberries:** Bluecrop and Duke are pushing in all areas of the Fraser Valley late this past week. A lot of Mummyberry spraying going on today as this appears to be the last good day for a while. Daytimes are still pretty cool, some morning frost.  
**Raspberries:** Still very slow to move. Sure would like a warming trend. I know the cool growing and soil conditions are a big factor, but in some fields I'm beginning to wonder if the big mite infestation last summer has taken some of the jam out of these plants, especially Meekers.
- **Skagit County, Northern Washington: (3/27/09)** With the buds opening on most everything (Bluecrop and Duke being the furthest along), I keep thinking the frost and cold temps are going to hurt us at some point, but so far, they seem to be tolerating it pretty well. It looks like weather will keep us out of the field for a while yet. Ordered two cases of sunshine, only to find out it's back ordered.
- **Whatcom County, Northern Washington:(3/26/09)** Kind of late for parkas and wool hats. Baby raspberries pushing now, a little bit of lime sulfur going on. Blueberries pushing, but no sign of Mummyberry growth. Strawberries sitting out this dance. Raspberry planting still pretty much on hold.
- **Northern Willamette Valley, Washington, Oregon: (3/30/09)** A broken record but—it's just really slow and looks like it'll continue that way for a couple more weeks at least. In blueberries: some of the early flowering cultivars like Patriot and Legacy are starting to move into pink bud stage. Mummyberry and Pseudomonas prevention sprays going on. Blackberries and raspberries are breaking with some growth about an inch or two out in some fields. Pretty variable across differing areas. Still no real cold damage evident, but we're getting into the plant development time when a cold spell could do damage.

## Ongoing Pest Information

### Diseases

**Disease Alert: Mummyberry:** Infections can take place at green tip stage. If the field or adjacent fields have a history of mummyberry infections, preventative applications should begin at green tip stage.

**Disease Alert: Pseudomonas (Bacterial Blight):** Environmental conditions are prime in many areas for Bacterial Blight damage. These are primarily plants that are breaking dormancy along with night temperatures that go below freezing. Control/prevention agents should be in place well before cold night temperatures happen.

- **Phytophthora Root Rot raspberries:** Time to use a fungicide drench in raspberries.
- **Purple Blotch blackberries:** The lesions are easily visible and growers can assess the level of infection.
- **Blackberry Rust** (Phragmidium Rust) **evergreen blackberries**
- **Cane Blight raspberries:** A good time to spot symptoms of cane blight is as the buds break.

### Insects

- **Winter Moth/ Bruce Span Worm blueberries:** Begin scouting for Winter Moth larvae as buds start breaking.
- **Raspberry Crown Borers caneberries:** March is the time to drench for crown borer control in caneberries.
- **Strawberry Crown Moth southern caneberries:** The treatment is the same as for RCB.
- **Clay Colored Weevil northern raspberries.**
- **Redberry Mite evergreen blackberries.**
- **Scale blueberries:** A dormant oil or [Esteem](#) (Pyriproxyfen) can be used while blueberries are dormant.
- **Leafroller larvae blueberries**

### Other

- **Voles:** Zinc phosphide baits can be applied only until budbreak in caneberries and blueberries.

## Cropwork

### All crops

- Plan fertilizer program.
- Weed control.

### Blueberries

- Can apply Mummyberry control materials and/or take other Mummyberry management actions.
- Can apply Bacterial Blight management materials (e.g. copper, [Serenade](#)).
- Scout for Span Worms/Winter Moth.
- Make preparations to bring in bees around 10% bloom.

### Blackberries

- Scout for Purple Blotch Lesions.
- Apply insecticide drench for crown borer control.

### Evergreen Blackberries

- Dormant spray of lime/sulfur or elemental sulfur for Blackberry Rust and Redberry Mites.

### Raspberries

- Apply insecticide drench for crown borer control.
- [Ridomil](#) drench for Phytophthora Root Rot control.
- Scout for Cane Blight symptoms as buds break.

### Strawberries

- As plants start growing, check weak areas for Root Weevil larvae, Strawberry Crown Borers and/or root disease problems.
