The Weather Cafe by Rufus La Lone Small Fruit Cold Storage Report

The February-March period presents our berry crops with some specific risks related to plant development and weather extremes. So far, this late winter/spring has remained mild with relatively cold nights. Plant development has not been pushed to the point of being too sensitive to any late cold spells yet. It won't take much for blueberries to be into green tip stage and caneberries into breaking buds where they'd all be much more vulnerable. May or may not happen but be prepared.

Reminders:

- The deadline for Spartan herbicide applications on strawberries is February 28th.
- Zinc phosphide rodent baits can't be legally applied after bud break.
- Blueberry plants become vulnerable to Mummyberry infections at green tip stage (1/8" new growth on vegetative buds).

• Raspberries & blueberries: (Sunday, 2/17) Pretty well everything in bud swell up here. Nothing opened yet except I did see a field of Junes where the flower bud tips were open and exposing floral parts. Draper flower buds quite advanced and some appear near bud burst which is concerning. No real winter injury seen so far on blues or raspberry. But we haven't had a winter yet so that's only logical. Getting some really mild weather during the daytime (10-13C, 50-55F) but nights are cool to near freezing which keeps things a bit under control. Starting weed control in the blues and some raspberries. Pruning continues in a number of fields.

Willamette Valley, Oregon and SW Washington

- **Blueberries:** (Thursday, 2/14) At the North Willamette Research and Extension Center in Aurora, all of our blueberry cultivars (Duke, Bluecrop, Bluegold, Bluejay, Draper, Aurora, Liberty, Ozarkblue, Reka) are at fruit bud swell stage. Legacy is close to bud burst.
- **Blueberries:** (Thursday, 2/14) Looking at a few blueberry fields yesterday showed some Duke fields in the central valley just beyond bud swell and moving fast to the tight cluster stage. We've got some very mild days coming so they should be showing blossom clusters this next week. Fields looked like they've got a great floral bud numbers. The weather's been dry with a few showers—plenty of field work getting done. Blackened Pseudomonas twigs evident as usual this time of year—something to check out more next week as well as looking for any winter moth.
- Marionberries (Friday, 2/15) So far looks like we made it through the winter in good shape, no damage I can see. Now is the time to be brushing the canes to remove brambles. Of course the weather conditions have to be dry enough for things to break off rather than just get knocked around.

- Buyers of Washington berries and berry products are increasingly requiring growers be third party certified that the meet minimum requirements for food safety.
- The minimum standard for this is GAP (Good Agricultural Practices).
- It is very likely that new federal legislation will require growers to implement these standards soon.
- In order to help you meet these new standards the Washington Blueberry and Red Raspberry commissions will host a series of food safety meetings around the state.
- The training will have capabilities for a Spanish translation for employees and Punjabi at the Lynden location.

Pictorial blueberry growth stages with temperature damage thresholds

- <u>Blueberry growth stages and critical spring temperatures</u> (Michigan State Extension)
- The relevant stages & temperature thresholds from the chart:
 - o **Bud Swell:** "Visible swelling of buds; scales separated. Can tolerate 10-15 F (-12 to -9 C)".
 - o Tight cluster: "Individual flowers distinguishable. Can tolerate 20-23 F (-7 to -5 C)".

Crop Work/Pest Management Activities

All crops

- Weed management.
- Scout for and plan for Voles: Vole activity is apparent in many blueberry, caneberry, and strawberry fields. Management of voles is most effective in the spring before they start multiplying like...voles. Kind of like weeds (& starlings)—get them before their reproduction cycle kicks in! Click here for some background and biology information on voles (or meadow mice). Click here for information on how to construct bait stations.

Blueberries

- **Scout for** Pseudomonas (Bacterial Blight) Water-soaked lesions usually appear in February in some fields that then develop into reddish brown to black cankers.
- Plan for <u>Bird</u> issues: Starling management: Right now starlings are beginning to fledge. Population control becomes very difficult later into the season because they multiply rapidly. This is a major pest species plan your control strategy now.
 - o <u>European starlings and their control</u> (Cornell University)
 - o Starling Population Control Methods. (Wild Wing Company)
- Winter Moth/ Bruce Span Worm blueberries: Scouting for winter moth larvae should start as soon as
 the buds start swelling. We've had reports in previous years of problems beginning this early but it's
 usually in a couple of weeks. More of an ongoing issue in the northern growing regions but also an
 occasional, locally severe problem in some Oregon and SW Washington fields.
- Scale blueberries: A dormant oil or Esteem (pyriproxyfen) can be used while blueberries are dormant.
